## Two Filipino Scientists to take part in ACIAR John Dillon Fellowship

Canberra, Australia (22 October 2018) – Two Filipino agricultural scientists arrived in Canberra on 21 October after being selected to participate in the Australian Centre for International Agriculture Research (ACIAR) John Dillon Fellowship Program.

Dr. Cesar Limbaga, Jr., Dean of the College of Agriculture and Related Sciences of the University of Southeastern Philippines and Ms. Maribel Jalalon of the Bureau of Soils and Water Management of the Department of Agriculture will undertake intensive research management training in the next five weeks. Each participant will be hosted by a specific Australian institution to help enhance their leadership skills in agricultural research management, agricultural policy and/or extension technologies.
